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
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

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Extension to Tianjin Metro Line 3 to open this year

■ 3号线南站延长线年底试运营

天津南站配套交通工程正在稳步推进中,年底前地铁3号线南站延长线将 实现试运营。届时,乘客可以通过地铁直达天津南站这一综合性交通枢纽, 实现高铁与地铁之间的换乘。天津南站坐落于本市西青区张家窝镇,已经开 通运营的京沪高铁在此站停靠。地铁3号线延长线建成后,天津南站将成为集 国铁、地铁、公交等多种交通方式于一体的综合性交通枢纽。

The construction of the new subway line to Tianiin South Railway Station is on schedule. Extensions to the Tianjin Metro Line 3 will open for trial operation by the end of the year. Passengers will be able to travel to Tianjin South station by subway and transfer to the high-speed railway.

Tianjin South Station is located in Zhangjiawo Town, Xiging District, and is one of the stops on the Beijing-Shanghai high-speed railway. After completion, Tianjin South railway station will become a fully integrated transport hub which will include high-speed rail, subway, bus and other modes of transport. The Metro line 3 extension will run from Huayuan industrial park station to Tianjin South station. The 4 km of new track will have three stations and will be a major improvement to public transport in Tianjin.

你压力大吗?

你压力大吗?这是现在人们容易问到的问题。压力是当代人无法回避的难题,因为压力过大而罹患心理疾病甚至自杀的事例比比皆是。虽然适当的压力可以把人 的潜力发挥到最大,但是很多时候人们却无法有效控制这些压力,以至于让我们的 身心不堪重负。

我们采访了一些外国留学生和外国员工。对外国员工来说,来自客户和上级的高期望值总会给他们带来压力。这一点我们不难理解,保持工作上的良好业绩已经不容易,在中国工作还要和中国另一不断沟通。语言固然是一个障碍,两种文化不同的做事方式也时常让人感到力不从心。而对于习惯了按规则行事的外国人来说,最为担心的就是有人不守规矩。一些人的自私行为,总是会毁了别人的良辰美景。

留学生们的压力自然来自学业,学成之后的前途问题也会让他们烦心。有人说:如果上帝能告诉我一个把大脑关掉的办法,那我就不会有压力了。

那么我们应该如何缓解压力呢? 既然很多时候这些压力都是自身引起的,那么 我们就要学会说"不"! 也就是说,在适当的时候学会婉拒,可以让你避免承受过 大的压力。另外,我们要认满楚自己的压力类型,是来自工作、人际关系、疲劳还 是身体病痛,对待每一种类型都有不同的方法。

我们还特别要推荐一个舞蹈疗法。Salso舞蹈是一种拉丁舞,火辣的舞步和动感的节奏极富感染力。Salso老师张矛介绍说:拉丁舞可以让身体和精神都得到放松、在热闹的气氛中,人们很快会结交新的朋友。

总之,我们不妨活得潇洒一些,达不到的要求就降低一些。让生活简单一些,量入为出,不杞人忧天,讨好此时此刻!

tress – it can ruin our health, it can ruin relationships, and it can ruin our life. Because of stress people have even committed suicide. People suffering from work related stress sometimes resign. Because of stress some people simply choose to disappear, cutting themselves off from friends and family rather than deal with the stressful situation they face.

Yet a certain amount of stress is good for us. You can probably testify that being under stress has at times resulted in your best work, your best performance. You found reserves of strength and resources that you didn't know you had. In life-threatening situations, stress has enabled people to perform feats that on the face of it seemed from a human standpoint to be impossible. Stress can generate the adrenaline that gives us the impetus we need to propel ourselves forward.

Problems result, however, when stress becomes unrelenting and our bodies fail to relax. Managing stress is vital. If we let stress manage us, it could possibly become the number one threat to our health and well-being.

Where does your stress come from?

Our stress obviously comes from different sources at different times. Students of course suffer from stress related to their study load and exams. Wives and mothers have stress related to their homes, children and husbands. If they also have to work as well as looking after their family, that is another source of stress. One cute five year old told me that her mother is lazy because all she does is enjoy herself. I can hear thousands of mothers chorus "As if!" Husbands and fathers usually shoulder the load as far as supporting the family is concerned, hence they not only have to deal with work related stress, but also the responsibility of providing for their own. Where does your stress come from?

Personally speaking, my stress comes from meeting tight deadlines, although I think this is a good kind of stress as it enables me to work at a more frantic pace. I don't have time to think about whether or not I can meet a deadline - there is no question, I have to meet it. Sometimes as well as burning the midnight oil, I am also up before the sun shows its face. I can confirm that when I am under pressure, I often produce my best work.

l also have a certain amount of stress from living here. Trying to get on a bus and not get trampled in the stampede stresses me out. Worrying about if I will get across the road in one piece is another source of stress. Wondering if it is time to put my mosquito net up, (which makes me boiling hot and unable to sleep), or trying to get through another night without getting a visit from the mosquito mafia stresses me out. Sometimes I am unable to fall asleep for imagining they are just waiting for me to turn the light out before they come for me. Attempting to pay for my goods in the supermarket whilst trying to make sure that no-one pushes in front of me stresses me out. I could go on, but I am getting stressed just thinking about everything that causes me stress.

It is important to be clear about where your stress comes from and identify whether or not it really stress, as that is the key to managing it. We asked several types of people about their stress and it was interesting to get the different points of view.

The stress of business

David Wong interviewed some business people and this is what he found.

Paul said "Early this year, while I was completing my Master's degree in Hotel Management, the vast majority of stress stemmed from my school work. Now I am working, my stress mainly comes from my job. Expectations to perform are high and come from both guests and superiors". No doubt the Managers of the wonderful hotels in Tianjin can confirm that their jobs are really pressurised. However this must be offset by the extreme job satisfaction they get. A hotel is like a small city, its -residents all coming from different places. Their different needs must be catered to, whilst maintaining the general high standard. The Managers also have the pressure of adequately communicating their standards to the staff, which is not easy if they do not speak Chinese. In this respect Paul goes on to say "Some pressure is definitely self-inflicted. However, because of the gap in my ability to communicate and be understood by Chinese colleagues and customers, this situation can sometimes cause me stress". Many of the Chinese staff at the hotel speak some English and most General Managers have very capable



assistants that are fluent in English. However language is just one barrier. As we all know things are done differently here, and sometimes there is a conflict between what the staff think is ok and what the Manager finds unacceptable.

Denis, who is Swiss, highlighted something that we can all relate to, other people not following the rules. He told us "I was brought up following laws and regulations. My main pressure comes from situations where I believe people are not complying with them in China".

This is also where a lot of my stress comes from. I often go for a walk at 6.30 a.m. in the park, which is really beautiful at the moment, the flowers have all opened and the scent is heavenly. However interrupting my perfect scene was a man who, despite the fact that there are signs everywhere saying "Please don't walk on the grass", was not only walking on the grass but was pulling handfuls of the plants up. I was disgusted and asked a passing woman what the man was doing. She wasn't as incensed as me but she did tell him "You should be careful, if the security guards see you, you will be in trouble". His reply was "Oh they don't care. I do this often". He was pulling up the plants that had not yet flowered and he said he wanted to eat the leaves. Whenever he pulled up a flower by mistake, he just tossed it aside. I said to the woman "The flowers are for everyone to enjoy, if people pull them up there will soon be nothing". She told me not to worry and went about her business. I went on my way fuming and muttering about how selfish people are, so what should have been a peaceful stroll turned into a teeth gnashing experience. I was stressed out, particularly as I started to remember other occasions whereby people just thought of themselves and their own desires. You may think I would do better if I just minded my own business - I wish I could mind my own business, my stress would immediately reduce by half!

Back to Denis who says "Being self-employed and having to feed a family of 5 puts much pressure on me. To be able to finance the school fees of our 3 boys, keep a certain lifestyle for everyone and still build reserves for the time when I am too old to work is continuous pressure.' No doubt all the dads and mums will be able to empathise with Denis on this point. As his life is so pressurised, where does he get his strength from? That was an easy question for him to answer "I would say that very little pressure comes from my family. My wife is great and my sons, although sometimes demanding, are not really difficult to be with. After all I can identify myself with many situations when I was younger. My no. 1 counsellor is my wife. The infinite wisdom of my woman helps me in most of the cases to calm down and gain a better understanding as to the next step in respect of corrective action."

Student Stress

Some students gave us their points of view, but I must emphasise that the stress faced by foreign students here is totally different to the stress faced by Chinese students. In fact the answers that these students gave made me laugh out loud, so as they were able to be so humorous I am wondering if they are stressed. Or maybe their attitude is they have to laugh or they will cry. My question was "Amongst your circle of family and friends, who would you say has the most pressure?" One student's answer was "The only person with less pressure in my family would be our adorable Jack Russell Terrier, Cookie". I personally think that some of the dogs here have a lot of pressure. Some of the outfits they are forced to wear would give any self-respecting canine stress. I saw a doggie the other day with a denim jumpsuit complete with hood which had a huge pink bow on it. It was a boy dog and I am sure he was handing his little doggie head in shame.

To the question "What method do you use to release stress?" another student replied "Watching movies and drinking. If I can figure out how to turn off my brain, I will be a lot better off". Please, I beg you, if you ever figure this out be sure to let me know. Actually I think sometimes my friends already know how to do this. A case in point is when I was being bitten to death by mosquitoes, Mary decided to help me out. She went to my house before I got home and told my roommate that she could solve the problem. She closed the doors and windows and sprayed a whole can of RAID in my room. You will no doubt be familiar with this product, it clearly says it is dangerous and has chemicals in it that can cause cancer etc. As soon as I opened the front door, I was overwhelmed by the fumes and had an asthma attack. I was so ill that I could not move and spent the night on the sofa. The problem was that I was due to fly back to England a day later and I seriously wondered if I could make it onto the plane. "Did you not read the instructions on the can?" I wheezed and spluttered. Mary said "We always use this to kill insects and as you had so many mosquitoes I

thought it would be best to use the whole can. You have to admit it has killed all the mosquitoes". "Oh yes, it has killed all the mosquitoes it has nearly killed me too!" I shouted – well croaked at her. Yes having helpful friends is indeed stressful.

Another student had this to say; "Most of my pressure of course comes from school and from not knowing where I will be in the next year or so". Yes that is where some of my pressure comes from too. I don't know how long I will be here. Each year that I go home to England I check what my family situation is. I really want to stay here for the time being, but I also feel guilty as my parents are getting older and I am so far away. One year my mother was seriously ill and was taken to hospital. My family did not tell me until the

crisis was over as they did not want to worry me. The problem is now that whenever they call me and I ask how everything is, they tell me it is ok, but I don't know if that is true or not, and so the anxiety of not knowing the true situation causes me stress, the very thing they

wanted to avoid. This student went on to say "Most, if not all of my stress is from my projection of what I should be doing, the stress I feel from my family only concerns my desire to take care of them as well as myself. When I am in pressurised situations I withdraw into myself. My solution is to read books in my bed with a cup of tea or take a quiet nap. I also recommend to my friends who are feeling stressed that they have a quiet night either by themself, or to have a talk with another friend over coffee or a drink". There is a lot to be said for having a quiet night in. The experts say that lack of sleep naturally affects our ability to deal with stress. When I am tired, everything is too much trouble, little problems explode and become major catastrophes.

STRESS RELIEF

Sometimes we have to honestly examine ourselves and ask if the reason we have stress is self-inflicted. Trying to do too much is a problem for many people, so just say no! I find that a lot of my stress comes from overscheduling. Not wanting to let someone down can mean that we have too many commitments and cannot fulfil all of them. Sometimes I run around like a headless chicken and then get nothing done. Therefore if you lighten your load you will find that you lighten your stress too.

My Chinese friends suffer from this kind of stress because they will do anything for their friends, even if it means great inconvenience to themselves. I am sometimes staggered at what they are prepared to do for friends. I often say "I would never ask my friend to do that". One friend asked me to bring something back from England for her. I pointed out that I was only allowed 20 kilos and since I wouldn't be going back for another year, that 20 kilos was very precious to me, hence I asked her "Do you really need this?" She said "Oh my friend asked for this". I was quite annoyed and asked her why she was asking me to do something that would inconvenience me and it was for someone I barely knew. She then made the situation worse by telling me, the item was actually for her friend's friend, someone she didn't



even know either. If I can't help, I just say so. It makes me a little unpopular – but nevertheless stress free as far as this particular situation is concerned.

Entertainment can also be a source of stress, particularly if you are spending large amounts of time on it. It is said that entertainment should be like the dessert course, not the main meal, a little goes a long way. If someone goes out every night, then something will have to give, that time spent on entertainment has been bought out from somewhere else. Students particularly suffer in this area because as they are a social bunch, and study and homework requirements are heavy. Some find to their cost that they have attended one party too

many and their school work has suffered. Trying to catch up causes them untold stress. Just say No! This is good advice for everybody, and if you feel you cannot turn someone down outright, tell them you will get back to them once you have checked your schedule. You can also ask yourself 'Can I really afford to invest the time and energy needed for this activity?'

LET GO

Are you a control freak that needs to manage everything and everyone? If you are, no doubt you will be extremely stressed out. One person admitted that "even the stress from friends is self-induced because I start trying to micromanage things". I have a friend that is really, really kind, she thinks about everyone but herself. However this causes her great stress as she worries too much and tries to think for everyone. I asked her recently "Do you really have to deal with this. can't you let them work it out for themselves?" My question shocked her, because as I said Chinese people will do anything for their friends and would rather suffer themselves than let a friend suffer. However she agreed with me that there comes a time when the help she gives is more of a hindrance, as it means that people rely on her to run their lives and do not take responsibility for themselves. When my friends ask me for advice and I give them a good solution, if they ignore it and get themselves into more trouble. I don't help them to resolve the situation. My father's mantra when I was growing up was "Who can't hear must feel". This meant if we disobeyed his directions/orders, we would feel his wrath and he "would teach us a lesson we would never forget". I now find myself quoting "who can't hear must feel" all the time, as my darling friends think that my advice is not suitable for them as only another Chinese person can understand them, so having asked me, they go on to ignore me. If a Chinese friend has given them different advice they take that, regardless of whether it is good or not. In that case, whatever the result I just let them get on with it. Just let go! This is my unprofessional opinion, but the experts were also on hand to give us good advice as to how to deal with stress.

Dealing With Stress the Expert Way

Liz Li is a PhD candidate at Peking University and a writer. She says "There is a distinction between tension and stress. Tension can be good and bad and on a bell curve, we need the tension to go right up to our limit, but we do not need it after it goes "over the top" (OTT). OTT is when hyper-tension could set in over a long period of time if there is no resolution. Before it goes to the OTT stage, tension is creative and motivational, so it is necessary to distinguish between types of stress i.e. work stress, emotional and relationship stress, fatigue stress, (for people who are enjoying themselves too much but no time to rest), and physical stress. People who work out too much, but do not realize or admit the type of demands it is making on the body and do not get adequate rest fall into this category. There is also mental stress which affects those who use the brain too much and boredom stress - those who don't use their brains suffer from this". (I will have to show this to Miss Mosquito Buster).

"All of these different types of stress will cause dysfunctions in personality sooner or later - the balance of these factors will be important even if it is consecutive rather than simultaneous. Causes are so varied that for a person's problems to be analysed, a specialist would need the specifics so that the right treatment can be identified". It was quite interesting to find this out, I didn't know there was a difference. Next time I lose my temper and start going crazy I will try to identify what I am suffering from, tension or stress. It might help me to control myself and calm down!



Dance your stress away

Lance, who founded the Lance Culture and Art Centre, Tianjin's first and only professional salsa dance culture institution, told us "Not only will dancing reduce stress, but taking our classes is a great way to socialise and in addition we have organized a variety of activities. I hope the Centre can be used as a place to share special moments. I also hope that visitors can think of the Centre as a home".

I asked "if someone told you they had a lot of pressure, for example, pressure from work what kind of suggestions would you make?" His reply was "Pressure can be from a workload that is too heavy, but on the other hand it may be from the burden of psychological pressure. I would recommend that they first pay attention to their diet and make sure that they get enough rest time. Proper exercise can help improve sleep quality and improve the ability of the body to restore itself. However I think that the exercise need not be too vigorous, and therefore salsa is perfect. Also, I would recommend taking part in some fun activities, find a new environment, meet some new friends, chat, and drink coffee or tea, and listen to music. It is important to refresh yourself, do not always be caught up with work that is too intense"

Another question I asked was "Exactly how does dance relieve stress?" His reply was "My personal understanding is this: in primitive society dancing was something that they did even before the emergence of language. People used to express their inner feelings by the way they moved their limbs. Dance also had different meanings and purposes, for instance for worship rituals, social, performances and games, it wasn't just for physical exercise. This is not surprising, as dance still plays a lot of different roles. Actually not all dance can reduce stress". This is absolutely true, think about war dances. Also can you imagine if the New Zealand Rugby team performed a "relaxing" Haka before a match? The Haka is a traditional Maori dance and chant which has many forms, but the one the Rugby team perform is a war dance to psyche themselves up for the impending 'battle' - the last thing they want to do then is to relax! Also whenever I hear pumping techno music, particularly in a gym, of course the aim is not to relax but to exert oneself rigorously

Lance continues "Salsa, on the other hand can reduce stress. Latin music and dancing is not only exciting, it is contagious and gives us the opportunity to make new friends. In turn this has both physical and psychological benefits. It is a great way to relax". This is the kind of stress relief that I like (I also find that eating lots of chocolate instantly makes me feel better).

Parker Barriball has things to say about stress:

WORKOUT

I cannot stress this point enough, your body and mind work better when they have an outlet for the overstimulation of living in a city like Tianjin. Any city provides more than enough noise and light



pollution than what we are designed to handle. Rather than take that stress out on someone smoking in the lift, which I've been tempted to do more than once, I take that stress to the gym. Tianjin is full of options when it comes to finding a gym, and they vary in price so even students can afford them. However, a gym is not the only way to work out stress. You would be amazed at how good you feel with a quick morning workout consisting of pushups, sit-ups, and a jog. It kick starts your mind and body for the rest of the day and you are less likely to snap under the pressure of narrowly missing being spit on while walking down the street.

Multiple Circles of Friends

As a foreigner I have several very distinct sets of friends. I have fellow laowai friends, many of which are older than me, Chinese friends, and a mix of student friends. When I need to vent in a safe environment, its off to the pub with foreign friends. When I need to understand the latest dramatic episode involving local coworkers, I value the insight of my Chinese friends that can give me a peek



into the thinking of the Chinese. And, when I need to get the perspective of friends who are in a similar situation as me, I hang out with my student friends. I am lucky in that my home university, Florida State University, has tons of alumni here in Tianjin. It's nice to have the option to speak with those who know exactly where I am coming from, but can see things more objectively. The good part about having circles of friends with little overlap is that you get to speak a bit more freely when you are stressed without worry of offending someone. I am not advocating talking poorly of others behind their back, it's just that getting things off your chest is important and you don't want to worry about what gets back to whom. A word to the wise though, in two years I have found that regardless of being over 12 million strong, Tianjin can seem like a very, very small town, and with that comes the trend of everyone knowing everyone else's business.

Get Out

If you are a foreigner, no matter how assimilated to the local environment you fancy yourself, you will at some point need to get out of the country to keep yourself sane. I like Tianiin, and plan to stay here for



the foreseeable future, but that doesn't mean that I don't look forward to spending a summer or Christmas back in the States. Even if you don't go home, catch a plane to Thailand or Vietnam and experience something other than the daily grind.

Stress is a part of life, and if you can successfully use it to help you excel at a given task, be that work or play, you will find living in Tianjin much more rewarding. If you don't, you may belly up to the bar and never leave; I have observed both in the foreign community here in

Tianjin. If you are feeling stressed and your usual methods are proving ineffective, get outside of comfort zone and try something new to stay sane.

Just Do It!

Another thing that can cause stress is procrastination. Yes the old proverb is definitely true, "Don't put off until tomorrow what you can do today". We all have to do things that we do not like to do but putting these tasks off just leads to more pressure and stress time-wise. I have a method, if I have something on my plate that I do not like to eat, I eat that thing first and get it out of the way. That way I can safely enjoy what else is on the plate. If I leave it until last, I will be too full and it is not easy to then force it down. However I find that whenever I have something to eat that I really like, I can eat it until it is coming out of my ears. Applying this principle in my life is beneficial, I do the tasks I like least and get them out of the way. Then when I have jobs to do that I like, I can whizz through them. So getting started early, even if you don't finish something is the key to eliminating stress from this particular direction.

Simplify your Life. We all collect far too much stuff. Stuff equals stress. Disposing of possessions we no longer use or need, or even want results in less to do. The more stuff we have, the more work we have to do to maintain, clean and repair it etc.

Control your spending. Overspending results in stress, therefore spending less money means less stress. Identify whether you really need something, or whether you just want it. Needs and wants are two different things. Don't let your wants control you.

Our body reacts in a marvellous way to stress, we all have a wonderful stress response system that is designed to help us. Stress in manageable doses can make life enjoyable and exhilarating, providing us with the stimulus to be creative, productive, enthusiastic, and healthy. Therefore Stress can become an enemy or a friend, depending on how you manage it. When we let stress manage us, that is when we start to have problems.

Sometimes we worry about the future, which stresses us out. Some good questions to ask yourself are these; 'What do I fear most? How likely is it that this fear will become a reality? How much energy do I expend worrying about what may or may not happen?' Sometimes

we worry needlessly and then our fears prove to be groundless. Worry about solving today's problems today and deal with tomorrow when tomorrow actually comes. Maybe tomorrow will have its own trouble, but sometimes the problem has resolved itself and we have worried and given ourselves stress for nothing. If you are suffering from stress, resolve whatever problems you can by yourself, and get help when you can't. A good support network is vital and as they say, "a problem shared is a problem halved".

Making Good Sandwiches and Good Money

get to find out all kinds of interesting things when I interview people and I get exposure to knowledge and information that would otherwise be unavailable to me. This week I got to interview Todd Mischke, who is the Territory Developer of Subway Tianjin. He gave me a unique insight as to how the franchise business operates here.

If any of you have your own business,

you will know it is not easy. It sounds good, being your own boss, calling your own shots, making your own decisions etc., but the financial outlay, responsibility and worry that it brings, surely must be overwhelming. Having a franchise can ease some of the pain, and as I listened to what Mr. Mischke had to tell me, I thought having a Subway franchise must be fool proof.

I have often wondered how anyone

makes any money here, as once someone has a good business idea, everybody else copies it and then they all go bankrupt. Sometimes when I am out and about and see yet another coffee shop opening in a small area where there are already numerous coffee shops, or an English school where there are already several, I explain again the rule of supply and demand to my friends. Mary said that her father had a thriving business making doors in their village. As he was making quite a bit of money lots of other people decided that they wanted to make doors too, now there are five people doing it in the same small village and they are all just eking out a living. "Supply has outstripped demand, why did they all jump on the bandwagon?" I asked her. "Because my father had a good idea, he has made a lot of money. He is quite clever so other people copied him" she said proudly and without rancour. "They are just cutting everyone else's throat and dying themselves at the same time" I say, so part of the problem is that imagination is lacking. Chinese people like to do business for themselves, but some don't think it through. A friend recently ran a business idea past me, it sounded good on the surface but when I said to him "You have to have enough money to last you for a year, just in case you don't make any money immediately" he was horrified. Hence just as soon as many businesses open, they close.

The Subway franchise system may be ideal for China and here's why. It is an instantly recognized and trusted international brand, known for healthy eating options. Chinese people tend to trust imported things and ideas. Let's face it, if you are going to buy a sandwich, there is only one famous name, so the brand has cracked the supply and demand requirement - there is no other competition.



The initial outlay is relatively modest, overheads are low, staff training is relatively guick and easy so even if a franchisee loses some of his staff, training new ones is a breeze. This is all down to the very simple idea that is behind Subway, what you see is what you get - sandwiches that you design vourself, no fancy schmancy thrills and kicks. If somebody has 550,000 rmb to invest, this will get him a relatively simple shop, if he has 850,000 that will get him a more complicated shop. Investing in this business does not require a high degree of business acumen, it is a tried and tested model and Subway will hold his hand all through the process. They get a shop fitted out and ready and will even make the first food order for the franchisee.

I wanted to know how they maintained the high degree of quality and hygiene that we expect from the brand. Their method is genius. Subway leases the premises from a landlord and then sub-leases it to the franchisee. Every thirty days they go into the shop and do an inspection to make sure that things are being done as they should - there are 18 sections to the inspection. If there is any kind of problem at all, warnings are given, if there is the same problem three times in a row, Subway will simply begin the process to evict him. It is not a one way street, if the franchisee wishes to sell his business, it is can be very easy to do, the whole business can be transferred very efficiently and guickly. One

thing Mr. Mischke was anxious to make clear, is that if a franchisee finds a good location, plays by the rules and works hard he has a great chance to be successful. Of course no business is without risk, but really this is not rocket science and is perfect for a person who has money to invest but no business experience in this field.

Mr. Mischke has been in the franchise business for most of his life, and he was involved in the Dairy Queen franchise in China. The Subway system is quite interesting, franchisee's can then go on to become developers in the business, that is quite a unique idea, job enlargement and promotion whilst being a franchisee. This is what Mr. Mischke is doing now, although he has four Subway stores to his name and plans to open two of his own stores every year. That's a good enough endorsement, the fact that he is confident enough to invest quite a lot of his own money.


There are 37,000 Subways worldwide, but I was still surprised to see it in Tianjin, however the statistics are impressive. I was told "There are now 21 Subway stores in Tianjin and there are plans to open a new one each month. Franchisees need to work hard and have a good attitude, ultimately personality is more important than experience. Of course no business is risk free, but this is one of the lowest risk investments in the industry. Somewhat surprisingly,

Tianjin has the highest average store sales figures in the whole of China. The franchisees that do well are the ones that are very involved in the running of the business."

I wondered how potential franchisees got to know about this business opportunity. There is information in the store, but also there are plans to put the information on the tray liners. Mr. Mischke says "I find that cold calling here does not really work, it is better if the growth is organic". As the stores are so successful, what about over supply? It seems that Subway has thought of this too. They have policies to ensure that all new locations will not negatively impact existing stores. In fact, a franchisee of a current store can require that Subway do a market survey to demonstrate that the new store will not hurt their sales. With this good business strategy, small outlay and overheads, professional handling and an international brand on offer, it seems like a perfect business opportunity.

I really liked a story about the founder of Subway that was related to me. He was asked at a business meeting "Where do you see Subway in 40 years, what will we be selling?" The founder's reply was "We will be selling sandwiches". If it ain't broke, don't fix it. A sandwich business that sells sandwiches - not a jack of all trades, but a master of one. Mr. Mischke told me that he was quietly confident about this business and I fully understand why.

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ou are one in a sea of over a billion, work is stressful, your free time is short, parents and grandparents are constantly asking, or pushing, for a date when you will be getting married. Welcome to the stereotypical life of many young, unmarried Chinese. As we have discussed in past issues, dating in China is complicated to say the least. Societal pressures and norms are enough to drive young, eligible suitors crazy, much less divorcees or those that otherwise fall outside of strict definitions of desirable. Add to that the time demands of a job and finding a mate becomes even harder. One answer to this problem has been the proliferation of online dating sites that aim to help people find a mate, and avoid wading through the deep sea of potential soul mates. Interestingly though, many of the large Chinese dating sites are losing money in a big

In the great Chinese tradition, these sites are essentially copies of western models like Match.com. Despite being a profitable business model in the West, Chinese sites are still posting less and less impressive numbers. In fact one of China's largest dating sites, Jia'Yuan, posted a 34% loss in profits in 2012

compared to the same period of 2011. The reasons for these losses stem from several different areas, some of them market driven, like increasing advertising costs, some of them natural idiosyncrasies of the locals, like a strict aversion to paying for online services. The profit model as it stands is to allow users to register and maintain a profile for free, but with limited access to full features. If users want access to full features they must spring for a subscription. Users can also send virtual roses for real RMB which potentially adds to

site revenues. JiaYuan's own reporting shows that most people leave after six months. Ironically, when their product works, users finding a match, customers no longer need the service, so naturally the better the site works, the faster the site loses customers.

Sites in the West like Match.com use advanced algorithms to matchup potential dates. One complaint of Chinese users is that the algorithms of Chinese sites like BaiHe are not advanced enough to be useful. The potential mates suggested by the site among



its millions of users are generally a bust for many users. Many users go through the initial steps of making a profile, but are quick to stop using the site when they don't find success right away, rather than pay for full access and put in real effort.

Rising Costs

The lifeblood of sites like the ones mentioned above is a high volume of users paying on a subscription basis for access to the site. A Large volume of new users is a key as users will leave the service if it works. In order to attract sufficient numbers, these sites rely heavily on advertising across media outlets. Even though sales in the online dating industry are expected to grow from 1.3 billion RMB in 2012 to 2 million this year, the top the dating sites, Baihe, JiaYuan, and Zhen'ai have been experiencing and are expecting continuing losses due to soaring marketing costs. However, balance sheets are not the only challenge facing the industry.

Fraud

Surprise, surprise, dating sites in China have been hit hard by fraudsters. While it is sad that the spamming of these dating sites render them almost useless, one must admire the creativity of some of the scammers. One common tactic of bar owners is to hire people to maintain online profiles and set up first dates at their own bar, which is more or less harmless, but there is a darker side to the fraudsters. One high profile case involved a woman who was duped by a suitor she met online. Xiao Fang, a Chinese woman who met a man that she wrongly thought was a high level executive of a company, had his child and gave him hundreds of thousands of RMB and only discovered afterwards that the man was in reality peasant from the countryside. She later sued Baihe for not protecting her

from the fraud. While I agree that sites have an important responsibility to protect against fraud on their sites where possible, in this woman's case one must ask just how good a trickester the guy was and just how naïve this woman was. Regardless of the lack of common sense of users, dating sites have been investing heavily in cleaning up their sites and report fraud to the authorities via small armies of monitors. Perhaps another reason for failure lies not in the structure of the sites but in the expectations of users.

The VP of JiaYuan, Zhou Zhongxiao, has been guoted in China Weekly of online date seekers, "Too many people want to seek a date that is out of their league. Why can't they be more realistic?" It's not the most glowing attitude to have towards one's customer base. but he may be on to something. In the West there is still a fairly negative stigma associated with online dating, but in China having an intermediary make introductions on behalf of potential couples is certainly nothing new. However the big difference with the traditional 月下老人 (Chinese matchmaker) was generally an aging spinster rather than an algorithm. Maybe people are over estimating their online profiles, only a small snapshot of a personality, to attract Mr. or Mrs. Right, I wouldn't advocate 'settling' when choosing a mate but how much can you really expect from an online site to both understand and recommend someone in regards of the heart, and/or wallet, when it's such a complicated process regardless of cultural background.

Solutions: Outside the Box, Offline

One solution that JiaYuan has explored is the ever-profitable wedding market, but

the industry is already fraught with competition. Despite 24 million potential customers annually, market share is highly divided so big dating sites have altered course again and refashioned themselves into headhunters for high earners. And this is a service that does not come cheap. Wealthy Chinese pay for the service for a set amount of time, around 8 months, with the minimum cost starting out at 40,000RMB. Package prices go up steeply if the potential suitor falls outside of desirable norms. For example, there is an accepted height ranges for both men and women, and women over 35 have to pay a hefty fee for the increased difficulty their age brings in finding a mate. Divorcees will also feel a sting in the wallet as their desirability falls through the floor as social stigma is highly negative towards those who have already marries. The record headhunting contract that JiaYuan has landed totaled up to 5 million RMB. Chinese Millionaires are certainly a profitable option but as one might imagine, it is a highly niche market.

These solutions however, still do not gel with the basic model of dating sites. If Chinese sites cannot capture the necessary volume and future users that their Western counterparts do at a reasonable cost, they will have a hard time staying in the black. Perhaps the local conventions just are not suited to the model. It may also prove that costs on the advertising side are simply too high when all is said and done. Regardless of the factors working against the industry, the future of these sites will prove bleak if they cannot turn their losses around.

ou know when you're in the middle of discussing business with a potential trading partner and you get this feeling that something smells fishy even though everything seems legit and looks outright perfect? If you're working in an emerging market, then most probably, your gut feeling is right.

When it comes to deceiving looks, many examples come to mind but there are some that left me with a bitter taste in my mouth that I'd like to tell you about so maybe you can avoid being fooled as most new comers to

the market have been

The most common type of misleading agendas you'd meet in an emerging market are related to your trading partner's endeavors to oversell themselves to you. This by itself can be considered an over-marketing issue if not for the sinister intentions that lay beyond.

One such example is a manufacturing facility trying to look busier that it actually is like the one I told you about in a previous article. Another example is a supplier trying to convince you that they can't meet your

requirement in time and that they will have to treat you as an express customer if they are to produce your product promptly. Of course this express treatment is much more expensive than fair price but suppliers who take this approach usually know that you don't have a lot of options and that you'll most likely have to work with them any way. I've also told a story about such a monopoly in a previous article.

The other type of misleading stunts are PR based and those in my opinion are more sinister. The reason is that they rely on personal emotions and enforcing impressions that can be labeled as confidence tricks by commen or fraudsters. In big business, these are more common that you think or want to believe

The story started when a client to whom I offered consultancy services had a need for an outsourced product to be made within a limited budget and came to me to help decide on which production facility was the best choice for the project.

As usual, the technical specs were laid out and those suppliers who believe they can meet then were picked from the rather long list of possible manufacturers. The next round of qualifications were focused on choosing those who can produce the product in time for the planned market penetration campaign. Pre-final round resulted in a list of just two supplies who could meet the tight budget when it came to the guote.

So how do you choose between two suppliers who had the same technical capability, production timeframe and price range? Well, you go to meet both and decide based on the perception you get from both. This here is the most critical phase since it is mostly subjective and feelings as you know can't be easily quantified. How do you rate the attitude you FEEL from the supplier's team and how do you calculate the personal impression you end up with after meeting with a CEO?

The issue becomes more dangerous when working in emerging markets as previous work records are shady at best and can be easily forged for the right price. These are the days when you truly value the efforts of consumer protection bureaus in advanced economies where the government databases provide valuable insight in the true abilities and intentions of said supplier.

Don't get me wrong, I am not saying that

the business system in advanced economies are perfect but at least you have SOMETHING to rely on when deciding who would be the best supplier to manufacture your product when everything else is more or less similar.

In any case, we started our trip to the first of the two suppliers and as we arrived to the town we were met by the company's team who tried to make us feel at home as much as they could. We found the usual meet and greet routine to be acceptable and the team to be quite easy to talk to and communicate with

After a plant tour, we could easily say that we were satisfied and were happy to know that they have in fact been trying to achieve an ISO quality accreditation and would soon be able to receive it. What I took notice of, it that they didn't falsely claim being already accredited by the international organization and rather stated that they were currently working on implementing the ISO codes what will enable them to get it in the near future.

Now keep in mind that they didn't need to say that in a part of the world were ISO certificated can be bought or –even worseforged with a few connections and some free flowing funds into pockets of a few officials. This made their claim worthy of notice and gave me a good indication of things to come.

I felt that the facility was OK and that the team met all our requirements concerning communication skills and clarity. I ranked the supplier as being a very good potential business partner and I was now looking forward to see how the other supplier would fare in the same evaluation procedure so I can

make up my mind as to which one is a better choice.

One week later, we arrived to the other supplier's location and before we could say "Hello" we felt that this visit was going to be a very special one. We had already booked our hotel and wanted to go to leave our luggage and rest for a while before having lunch with the supplier's team and discussing business. However, and in a very welcoming move, the supplier informed us that they have already booked us a hotel room.

We politely refused since we already had a confirmed booking but they insisted that will drive us to the room they booked for us. Outside the station, there were a couple of high-end Mercedes limos waiting to take us to our host-chosen hotels. We were also informed not to worry about our initial booking and that they would take care of it.

As we arrived to the hotel, we found it to be a super-luxurious five-star palace-like residence catering to the elite of the business society of the town. Furthermore, as we followed our luggage we discovered that we checked into a pair of Imperial suites at the top floor of the hotel. This was certainly not a common move by a supplier but we were quite happy about it.

As you'd expect, the banquet wasn't any less flashy, as a historical dining room was booked for us came with a professional catering team, a superb meal and several expensive bottles of wine. What matters even more is that the supplier's CEO was personally there to host us and talk serious business.

As the dining room was huge, we got a chance to meet several of the team we would

be working with in a round table environment that gave us a very positive experience from all the company's departments. Even more enticing, was the unexpected English language level that the team demonstrated along with highly developed communication skills.

Next, as we toured the facility, our hosts could tell that we were impressed by the quality, effectiveness and order illustrated all around. We were even driven around in one of those golf carts seen in multinational owned production facilities to cover the grounds faster and with less effort.

When we arrived to the warehouse, I asked if I can see some of the stored finished products and they were very happy to hand some very carefully packaged components for me to inspect. I had recognized the product as being one of our competitor's and it was truly well made BUT to my surprise, it had been labeled with a different brand. When I enquired about it, I was informed that this brand belonged to the supplier itself and that they manufactured for external clients like myself and at the same time had their own brand but the brand was registered through a third party so it was not directly affiliated with the manufacturer.

This raised many red flags in my mind as I was sure that this design belonged to one of our competitors whom I know produced their products at the same facility. This meant that the supplier has been stealing our competitor's intellectual property and re-branding it with their secretly owned brand. Of course I didn't tell them that I noticed the theft but I knew that THIS was the catch. "There is always a catch to being ENEXPECTEDLY treated like royalty" I thought to myself

They were welcoming us like kings because to them we were golden-egg laying chicken, as business partners AND a source for free research and development results. This was not going to work for us so I informed the head of our team about the issue and it goes without saying that we decided to choose the other supplier. It was a more humble but more honest one. And that for me was more important that a flashy hotel and a royal meal.

Always take a probe deeper and take another look into business deals that appear too welcoming and proceed with caution on these frontiers. Have a good profit hunt.

I think it is a very exciting time to be involved in The Westin, from the staff's point of view, and from the guests' point of view. More good news is that you don't have to stay at the hotel to take advantage of some of the best deals in town, for instance, Ladies' night at the Qba, where ladies are offered free cocktails and there will be salsa nights.

室友: 是敌是友

不久前,中国四川省雅安地震发生时,四川师范大学男生一人抱着六台笔记本,背着三台单反,手里还拿着一只小乌龟冲出宿舍,拯救了全寝室财产。该男生的事迹受到众多网友及名人的关注,更亲切的称呼他为"中国好室发"。大家对于此前有关"室友"的一系列负面报谱带来的消极情绪也被一扫而空,纷纷表示又开始相信友谊。众所周知,中国大学的宿舍非常挟小拥挤。通常是好几个彼此完全陌生的同学住一个小房间里,这样自然会产生无数大大小小的问题和摩擦。这些孩子大多数是独生子女,在家都过着衣食无忧的生活。突然开始过独立的生活,当然会感觉非常茫然。除了完成大学的学业,还要学做简单家务,比如洗衣,打扫卫生等,更加重要的是学习如何与人相处。

ne of the obvious drawbacks of having to live with a stranger is that you never know what you are going to get. On rare occasions students have been driven to suicide by their roommates or even to murder. In China dormitories are generally small and crammed with people, it is common to have eight students in one room. Forcing several complete strangers to live together naturally creates myriad problems, but add to the mix the background of many of these students, who are generally from single child families where they have been treated as princes and princesses, and it

makes the situation potentially explosive. They, for the most part, have been used to being waited on hand and foot and then suddenly they are expected to clean up after themselves. They have been used to their families doting on them and making them feel important, and suddenly no-one is taking any notice of them. They are not used to having to consider anyone else and suddenly people are objecting to their behaviour. They cannot express themselves and they cannot accept that there is anything wrong with what they do.

My own experience is this; when I first

came here to study Chinese I lived in the Foreign Students' Dormitory. There were two types, one type was an apartment with three bedrooms and the other type was one room to be shared with another person. I opted for the apartment thinking it would give me privacy. Unfortunately I was sharing it with two 17 year old girls that were away from home and country for the first time, and they made good use of their freedom. They would go out nightclubbing until the early hours and then I would be woken up by them coming home, as my room was next to the front door. I tried not to mind too much, telling myself that I was their age, once. However, what I could not overlook is that they often brought guys back with them and more than once when I needed to go to the toilet in the middle of the night, I felt I could not leave my room as there were strange men in the living room. One night in reception a guy said hello to me and asked me where I was from etc. I made polite conversation for a few minutes and then excused myself. A few

minutes later the same guy knocked on the door. I was completely unnerved, but he told me he was looking for his friend. His friend turned out to be one of the girls, who promptly invited him in. Shortly after that there were embarrassing sounds coming from her bedroom and it was obvious that they were more than just friends.

The other girl was an absolute princess who did not do anything to keep the place clean. Our kitchen area was so filthy when I moved in that I could not use it until I had degreased it all, but a few days later it was back to its original filthy condition. As for the state of the bathroom and toilet....don't get me started on that. I had paid the rent for three months, but in the end I lasted less than six weeks, I moved out. It was truly an unforgettable experience - for all the wrong reasons.

Well that was my experience, it wasn't the end of the world, but for some people having the wrong roommate has led to tragic circumstances. A student here was at his wits end with his roommate's loud snoring. He filmed him and posted the video online in an attempt to shame him. Quite why he thought this was a good tactic to stop the snoring is anyone's guess, after all his roommate was surely not doing it deliberately. After the video was posted online their relationship naturally deteriorated into open hostility. Eventually the exhausted student couldn't take it anymore and stabbed his roommate to death. As the video was posted online and many people were aware of it, was there no-one that could have stepped in to help? Could the students not have been given new roommates? Could the killer not have confided in the university authorities? Maybe the desperate student had tried to get help, but maybe there was no other room for him to move to. Well whatever the case, one of them is dead and the other one will either face life imprisonment or worse. Two families have been ripped apart by this tragedy. This is certainly a situation that could have been avoided and a solution could have been found, but unfortunately the killer student found a permanent solution to what was a temporary problem.

Top causes of stress between roommates are noise and dirty habits. Other experiences that I checked out were people planting video cameras in the room and covertly filming their roommates' sex lives.

A tried and tested method to resolve conflict is to have an open and honest dialogue with a roommate about any difficulties. Being honest about one's own shortcomings is also useful, as although we sometimes expect perfection from others, we ourselves are not perfect. Being paired with somebody of a totally different background and culture is not necessarily a recipe for disaster, in fact it can be an enriching experience if both parties concede there is more than one way to do something, and that their way may not necessarily be the best way. Give and take and mutual respect will go a long way to smoothing over difficulties.

and I learned the hard way, and much to my

surprise, that the English way of doing things has not been universally adapted! Every time I get annoyed with her over a perceived fault I remind myself of my own flaws. This method quickly takes the heat out of my anger – and brings me back to earth with a bump.

If there are small matters causing friction why not let it go. Covering over, or not

If there are small matters causing friction why not let it go. Covering over, or not broadcasting small faults is really an act of love and shows that the offended person is genuinely interested in pursuing peace. There are enough stresses outside the front door, so my view is that my home should be a peaceful haven, not a battle zone.

Another piece of good advice is not to go to sleep angry, but resolve differences as they occur. If someone goes to sleep on an argument, in the morning they will not have cooled down, but will in fact be even angrier. As usual, motive is an important factor, if you are having problems with your roommate, what solution do you want to achieve, do you want to separate or are you interested in resolving the situation amicably? Splitting up is sometimes unavoidable and even advisable in some cases, but if the situation can be remedied easily, you know what they say.....better the devil you know. Some people are lucky to be paired with the perfect roommate who then becomes a friend for life. Finding a good roommate is a very precious thing, if you have one please cherish them.



WHEN IS A FOREIGNER NOT A FOREIGNER?

hen writing an article recently, I came across an unexpected problem. Some people objected to being called foreigners and preferred to be called expats. It was extremely difficult to find a term that encapsulated everybody who is not Chinese, as it was not possible or practical to name every single nationality that makes up the foreign population here.

Where do you stand on this issue, do

you object to being called a foreigner? I personally have no problem with this term as that is what I am. I am living temporarily in a country that is not mine. I do not consider myself to be an expat as I have only put down tenuous roots. I would describe an expat as someone who intends to stay ad infinitum, i.e. maybe they have married a Chinese person, or bought a property etc. In fact large numbers of foreigners here are not

expats, being students who will mostly definitely go home when their studies are finished

The biggest single foreign nationality here are the Koreans, they outnumber everyone else. Whole families come here because the father is working for a Korean company. There are some that have been here long term, but usually they only stay for three or four years and then they usually on

back to Korea. They would not describe themselves as expats.

I personally really object to someone calling me a Laowai. If you ask your Chinese friends what this term means, they will not want to hurt your feelings and will tell you it is a friendly term. However if you can find someone that is willing to be honest, you will discover that this is generally an insulting term. I say generally because it is not always meant as an insult and I will explain a bit more about this later.

Yesterday I walked past a man in a market, and he shouted out in a very loud voice "Whoaaaal!" I knew he was going to say something stupid because as I approached him, his mouth dropped exaggeratedly. I stopped dead in my tracks and turned around and stared at him, making him think that I thought he had called me. He was terribly embarrassed, as having caught my attention, he then did not know what to do. Instead of getting annoyed, I laughed out loud because he obviously didn't expect me to react. He is the type of person that usually shouts out "Laowai".

Last week when I was waiting on the platform in the metro a child suddenly came over from the other platform to me. examined me, ran away and shouted to her father "Yes she is a Laowai". The father then shouted in his equally loud voice "Is she, is she a Laowai?" which of course made me the centre of attention, when I was just quietly waiting and didn't particularly want to be put under a microscope. Another time I walked past a bunch of teenagers and they took delight in shouting out "Laowai" at the tops of their voices and then sniggering. Usually when I hear this term I am provoked to fury. However when I recently interviewed a Westerner, he referred to himself as a Laowai. He obviously has no problem with this term at all. Since we all have different reactions, this just confuses Chinese people even more. Obviously every language has disrespectful terms to refer to foreigners but I would never use any of the English ones to refer to anyone.

I started to wonder, are we giving Chinese people a problem? How are they supposed to address us? One Chinese person who speaks English very well had not heard of the term expat before, it simply is not a term that is taught in schools. I looked up the term foreigner and it gives the explanation as someone who comes from another country. Chinese people cannot tell the difference between the different nationalities and actually it makes no difference to them. People quite often ask me about American things and when I tell them I have no idea, they are puzzled. They try to talk to me about certain American TV series, and I am sure they don't guite believe me when I say I have never seen them. They think that American and English culture is the same. Of course there are some similarities, but there are also many differences. | think | am now in a position to explain what grits are, (for you English readers. I am not talking about what they put on the road when it snows. Your homework

Something happened recently which helped to clarify my mind on the matter. I was with a Chinese friend and a woman came along. She pointed at me and asked my friend "Is she a Laowai?" In my best Chinese I told her I was really not comfortable hearing her calling me a Laowai. She was mortally embarrassed and kept apologising, she had not meant to offend me and had not realised that I could understand her. She then asked a question that was like a knife to my heart "What am I supposed to call you?" I felt extremely foolish as I replied that the term foreigner is ok. Then I felt ashamed. I told my friend that I had just made a big mistake and she said "That woman did not mean anything bad. You are probably the first foreigner she has ever seen and spoken to". I felt uncomfortable for days thinking about the look of horror on her face as I told her I was insulted. Hence my decision is I won't necessarily get offended if someone calls me a Laowai. I will first think about their motive

is to ask an American).


for doing so. If there is no bad motive, why should I waste my energy getting angry about something so trivial.

If I had reached this decision a lot earlier in my life here I would have saved myself a lot of heartache. I can't tell you the amount of times I have been reduced to a shaking, furious mess because yet again someone on the bus announced to everyone "Laowai" in his best and biggest voice. If you ask me what I dislike most about being here, I can honestly say it is being referred to as a Laowai. No doubt some of you will think that there are more important things to get upset about, and now I agree. I won't let it spoil my life here anymore – at least I will try not to let it spoil my life here.

So let me ask you again, what term offends you? What should Chinese people call you? Another pertinent question is what should we call ourselves, as we are not all expats? I am not going to make things difficult for my Chinese friends by taking offence when there is none meant. Motive is all important, if they are referring to you as a Laowai simply because they don't know how else to address you, maybe you can consider letting it pass.

oot carving is a traditional art in China. Integrating ingenuity and skillful craft, root carving not only employs ways of expressions similar to wood carvings, sculptures and stone carvings, but also demonstrates the unique features of root carving by absorbing the techniques exhibited in the creation of other carving arts. Root carving preserves natural beauty. Ancient artists created lifelike and vivid works by a special technique, using expression based on the roots' natural forms. This kind of creation is not completely artificial, but is created by both human beings and nature.

However, root carving is quite different from engraving. It combines peculiarity with ingeniousness. Although its aesthetic principals share common ground with engraving, at the same time they are applied uniquely. The common ground is that they share expressive techniques of wood carving, sculpture, stone carving and so on, and overcoming weaknesses by acquiring other strong points. The difference lies in the natural shape of roots. During the creative process, root carving mostly maintains the natural form of the root, adding some artificial polishing. In other words, root carving is guided by the inherent qualities of the root, rather than by shaping images merely through carving.

In the eyes of root carving artists like

从选料到雕刻都亲力亲为的庞国星制作的每一件作品都是孤品,这让他倍加珍惜。现在他的博物馆的藏品已 达1800多件,并获得了两项根雕收藏数量最多的吉尼斯世界纪录。为了好好的保存所藏根雕,并让更多的人了解 根雕文化,因此建立了"根屋"博物馆,还聘请专人管理。为了让每一个根雕得到养护,"根屋"内甚至有一座 鱼池,这样就可以保持室内湿度。而且,游客们可免费参观,兴之所至的庞国星还会主动讲解、普及根雕文化。 庞国星认为,每一个雕琢出来的作品都是有生命的"活物",需要哪心养护,它们才会大放异彩。

Pang Guo Xing, the roots are alive, especially after his dedicated carving work. The dead roots come to life again and become exquisite artwork. In his private museum, thousands of root carving artworks are designed according to their natural shape. He said he will spend the rest of his life guarding and accompanying them.

Pang started his root carving career in the 70s, and since then has been looking for great material for carving across the whole country, including many remote areas. After years of hard work collecting materials, he made a lot of friends in some remote villages. Once they find good roots, they immediately inform Pang to come and have a look.

From selecting materials to carving, Pang is always in charge of every detail and he

makes each carving by his self, hence every piece displayed in his private museum "ROOT HOUSE" retains its uniqueness, and that is why Pang cherishes them so much. Now his collection in the museum is more than 1800 pieces and he has been awarded two Guinness World Records for root collection. In order to maintain the artworks in good condition and help more people to get to know about root carving art, he established his private museum, hired someone to manage it and even built a pond to maintain the humidity for the roots. What's more, visitors can get free entrance and Pang will explain the history or culture for you if you are lucky. Pang insists that every carving work is a "creature" with life so they need the most careful maintenance to shine brilliantly.

Music keeps inspiring



What is the impact of music (or art) for a student's academic performance and future life?

If you can sing, that's the cheapest way of making music and singing is one of the most expressive arts. Since I spent a lot of my time working with children, specializing in singing, I think singing basically is a whole body activity that uses your mind and other body functions. You will learn how to express yourself from singing.

I should say that we live in a world in which people seem to acquire information effectively but some of them don't know how to express information. I used to work not only in music schools, but also in business schools teaching marketing and business students how to communicate.

I know there has been a lot of research into CEOs from different companies. They would rather hire arts graduate students and teach them about business, or hire business graduates and teach them how to communicate. As an excellent employee you have to improvise, be creative and think outside the box.

I think music is the central to everything, including improving students' scores in school.

What is the main purpose for the music professor to come and join in the school musical event this time?

When I worked in Australia, I was teaching people to sing choir by ear in harmony, I met the music director of IST and personally got invited by him. It is common for artists to travel a lot and meet different people in different places. This is my first time to visit China. It is very exciting for me.

My task is that I am going to work with a group of students and make them into a choir over two days. At the end of two days, we are going to perform on the stage. I like to do things like this because it is intense and there is no distraction. The process of teaching by ear is also like a live performance every time. It is interactive, corresponsive and involves constant communication back and forth. I will try to create the music atmosphere and the

way I work is different from a classical choir.

What kind of benefit can students gain from musical events at IST?

First of all, even if students just learned to breathe properly, that could benefit their physical health. Moreover, singing can make them articulate which will definitely make them succeed in job Interviews in the future.

Secondly, during the music course, students will learn to communicate with teachers effectively and study very well in the class




Two former municipal buildings --managing the foreigners.

原天津英法租界内的市政大楼

从1860年开始、陆续有9个国家在天津建立租界地。这其中每个国家都会在自己的租界里建立一个市政 委员会以显示其对这一地区的管理和控制。各国租界中最大的两个市政委员会分别是英国和法国。

1889年,英租界的市政大楼建成。这个建筑气势宏伟,是由苏格兰和德国的设计师共同设计的。建造这 座大楼共耗费三万两千两户银,这些都是时任海关总长的德璀琳筹集的。市政大楼历时一年建造完成并举 行了隆重的启用仪式。戈登去世后,与之私交甚好的李鸿章提议把这座楼命名为戈登堂,并在大楼入口处 悬挂戈登的巨幅肖像。但很多人也批评这座大楼华而不实,是令人遗憾的浪费。

戈登堂除了是英租界市政委员会处理政务,召开会议的地方之外,还兼具娱乐休闲功能。每周这里都 要举办各种各样的聚会、舞会,而且吸引了很多其他国家的人来这里娱乐。从1897年到1903年,戈登堂及其 周边设施被不断完善。解放后,这里曾经是天津市政府的办公地(2011年政府搬入河西区)。戈登堂在1976 在地震中曾遭到严重破坏、目前仅存原始建筑的一部分。



I ith the partition of land beyond the Chinese city of Tientsin in 1860 after the Second Opium War, the various nations began to establish themselves. One mark of their control was the formation of municipal councils which regulated their concessions. The two biggest were the French and British Municipal councils, housed in impressive buildings.

The British Municipal Building - Gordon Hall.



The British concession was originally laid out by General Charles Gordon of the Royal Engineers. It was decided that a municipal building would be located where a high city wall stood. This was pulled down and in 1889, some of the stones used to construct a large hall in the 'Scottish baronial style'. Among those who designed it were a Scot who described it as 'Victorian Tientsin' and a German baker, Herr Franzenbach, who had been a stone mason in his youth. It had two rounded towers, Gothic pointed windows and doors, a battlemented skyline and bombproof catacombs underneath. Funds for building - some 32 000 taels of silver - were collected by Gustav Detring of the Imperial

Customs . It took a year to complete with a grand opening in 1890. Following the shocking death of General Gordon at the hands of the Mahdi in the Sudan, Li Hong Zhang who had a long-standing relationship with Gordon proposed it be aptly named Gordon Hall. Li Hong Zhang presented a large portrait of Gordon which hung over the inside entrance door to the main hall as well as some superb curtains and embroideries from various parts of China. The decorations and the name stuck, despite the building being criticized as 'a white elephant'

The Municipal Council had their offices here and held meetings such as those for land renters and the annual general meetings. Initially there was also a police station located there and law courts. Occasional field nights of the Debating Society took place in the hall. There was also a Municipal Library containing some 8000 volumes and subscribing to some 24 periodicals in the early 1900s. Formerly this library had belonged to the Customs' Club who handed it over to the Municipal Council in 1889

A large entertainment hall was used for social functions and balls. The Peking and Tientsin Times shows how farewells for significant people in the community were held here, for example. The hall was in particularly large demand during the winter months with weekly dances or 'Kettledrums', 'Smoking Concerts', fancy dress parties, They drew an international crowd and this mix was evident on the British Municipal Council itself with a German, Russian and three British members in the late 1800s. Generally the settler elite and expat businesses dominated on the council. In about 1892, a stage was built so some theatrical entertainments were put on with Gilbert and Sullivan proving popular and starring many local figures. Generally though it was the third-rate companies that did well there according to an Astor House hotel pamphlet 1907 which suggested, "It would pay a good company with a liberal repertoire of light comedy to come here...during the months of April and May". Clearly a little levity was needed for the foreign



In 1900, the Hall was a centrepiece in the Siege of Tientsin by Boxers during the Boxer Uprising. It had provided a refuge for the women and children in the British concession who had been able to camp in the basement area as heavy shelling broke out. Subsequently memorial tablets to those soldiers and sailors of the different nations who died were

placed around the main audience room.

At some stage, the British Volunteer Brigade had their headquarters

here and it was they who dealt with any outbreaks of fires, having sounded the alarm using a huge bell that was placed in the adjacent Victoria Park in 1900. The bell had been presented to the Chinese authorities by the Krupp Iron Works and had been originally located at West Arsenal (Hai Guan

The British Municipal Council held sway over the settlement which was extended in 1897, and again in 1903, with a full range of utilities and services (paved roads,

sanitary system, electric lighting, telephones, police force). These appealed to the wealthier Chinese who moved into houses in the concession despite restrictions on ownership. In 1919, a Chinese representative was elected for the first time and by 1930, the vice-chairman was Chinese with minutes of the annual meeting of ratepayers published in both Chinese and English. The country's turmoil was held at bay to some extent in these enclaves but the society was increasingly displaced and the municipal character changed despite the building remaining. It became the offices for the Tianjin City Government but was severely damaged in the 1976 Tangshan Earthquake. A newer building replaced the main portion of it until removed in about 2011 to the HeXi district. The new grandiose and somewhat overbearing Carlton Ritz is in its place, perhaps as imposing as the original building may have felt! All that remains of Gordon Hall is a small grey brick section complete with crenellations along Jie Fang Lu.










The French Municipal Building

This was located on Rue de Verdun (now Cheng De Dao). The French Municipal Administrative Council met here to deal with local affairs. It was built in 1924 and was the hub for management of the French concession. A small French library with books, magazines and journals was to be found here.

For part of the Second Sino-Japanese War and Second World War, the III Amphibious Corps of the US Marines had their headquarters in the building. It was outside it that a formal ceremony of the surrender of 50000 Japanese troops in the Tientsin-Tangku-Chinwangtao area was conducted on 6 October1945. General Rockey acted for the Chinese Central Government. Today the building houses a Cultural Centre.

PLASTIC FANTASTIC

or the second year running Koreans have topped the list as the nation having the most plastic surgery per capita. Although America is still the home of plastic surgery, Korea is snapping at their heels, it is seen as very normal in Korea and there is hardly a star who hasn't had something done. Even the TV dramas often mention it. A recent Miss Korea was criticised as being unrecognisable from photos of when she was young. She defended herself by saying "I never said I was born beautiful". I showed some Korean friends a video of a famous British female singer, and the first question they asked me was "Has she had

plastic surgery?" I checked and my expert friends were right. Apparently this star had had her nose done but I hadn't noticed it.

Plastic surgery is of course a personal choice, but one thing I think is a shame, is that many Asian women are changing their features to conform to the Western idea of beauty, and the result is that many of them are starting to look the same - blandly beautiful.

A good, or rather bad example of this is a Japanese lady called Vanilla Chamu, who has totally changed her appearance. She no longer looks Japanese and definitely looks Western. Her parents are devastated, as looking Japanese is not good enough for her.

Do a search on her and you will see what I

What has this got to do with China and particularly Tianjin? Plastic surgery is becoming more popular and acceptable and there are quite a few plastic surgery clinics here already. In fact there is one doctor who hails from Tianjin, of whom people are fond of saying "He has the fingers of God". He is famous for carrying out nose surgeries and Korean stars come here to get their operations done.

The most common procedures in Asia are nose jobs and double eyelid surgery. I really don't understand why this is so

important, but I have several friends that have had it done and they tell me it has made a big difference to the way they see themselves. I can't quite get to the bottom of how it is done, but it involves creating a fold in the eyelid, which makes eyes look bigger and more "Western". My friends tell me I can't understand as I have double evelids. I never realised there was any other kind of eyelid until I came here and people pointed it out. "But this is normal where I come from, everybody has this kind of eyelid" I say. "Yes that is why you can't understand. We think they are beautiful so we want them too", my friends reply. If I say I really wish they would just be happy to look Asian, my words fall on deaf ears. They point out the numbers of Westerners (famous ones) who have had plastic surgery. I tell them that some people have the dubious privilege of fame just because they have had a lot of surgery.

The most popular surgery in the US is breast surgery. It is also becoming very popular in Asia. I think it is really strange as Asian girls are generally very petite and slim, so when they go under the knife in an attempt to have a more buxom figure, I think it is very obvious. Near to where I live there is a breast clinic, which I naively thought it was a health clinic, it is not! Even in some elevators there are adverts for this kind of operation.

With "thanks" to the likes of stars such as Bevonce, Nicki Minai and Kim Kardashian, it is now desirable to have a large behind. Hence women in the west are endangering their health by either having implants or silicone injections to make their behinds bigger. Recently a British woman died because she allowed someone with no medical qualifications to inject her rear end with industrial silicone. It was never meant for human use and hours after being injected, she passed away. In another case an American woman had huge implants inserted and they kept on turning inside out, giving her a hideous shape. She eventually had them removed and appeared on a TV show, displaying them. They were monstrous

Although Asian women have not gone down this desperate route so far, there is another strange development, which much to my delight. I can tease my friends with. There is now special padded underwear on sale here which can instantly give women a big behind - much cheaper and safer than surgery. This amuses me greatly because one of the things that Chinese people always marvel at is how big Westerners' behinds are. There is an advert airing on public transport which advertises this underwear at a special price of 200 yuan. I say to my friends "How is it that you criticise our bodies but now you want to boost your behinds?" My friends tell me they have no plans to purchase this underwear at present, but I shall be keeping an eye on them.

Joking aside, the lines are becoming blurred now between Western and Asian ideas of beauty. Whilst I believe that some things won't change, such as them liking white skin and us liking tanned skin, whereas once very girlish figures were all the rage here, they now want to cultivate a more voluptuous image and Western features.

Again I say people are interesting in part because of the differences between us. If we all start to look like each other it will be a boring world. Tianjiners cannot understand why I would rather go and look at a hutong than Italian Style Street. They find European styles interesting, just as I find Chinese styles interesting. The differences are what add flavour to life.

When two of my friends got their eyelids done they expected me to say how much more beautiful they looked. I didn't, it made little difference to their appearance anyway. I find this preoccupation with outward

appearances very tiring. I refuse to be moulded into somebody else's idea of what is beautiful, hence I will not starve myself to become skinny (although I have to do a little cutting down as far as the cakes are concerned), have surgery or worry about my appearance any more than is strictly necessary.


To my friends who are always accusing me of being an eyesore, I have two responses, "If you don't like my face, please do not look at me", or "Don't look at me, go and look in the mirror because I don't like what I see when I look at you either". I am just joking of course—I don't bother looking at them too closely.

Having plastic surgery may possibly highlight another perceived flaw, which will mean another operation to correct the new flaw and so forth. The waterfalls of the Nanling Forest Recreation Area

广东南岭国家森林公园

南岭国家森林公园方圆273平方公里,汇聚了南岭植物种类的精华,是广东省最大的自然保护区,也是目前广东唯一保存完好的原始森林。森林公园内共有4个景区可供游览:亲水谷、小黄山、瀑布群和石坑。。公园里的负离子含量为广东之最,特别是瀑布群景区的负离子含量约方每近方厘米10万个,其中"飞流潺"达到每立方厘米17万个,绝对是一处纯天然氧吧。而且,南岭的水质属于低矿物水,呈弱碱性,水分子体积更小,容易快速被人体吸收,加快体内新陈代谢,对现代人的亚健康体质有一定的疗效。近期被网友追捧的园区植屋酒店,是南岭国家森林公园聘请香港设计师,将林业局招待所改造成一座酒店,让老旧建筑物版发青春,重新接待各方游客入住。

Because of Guangdong Province's economic status as one of the most prosperous economic provinces in China, it is also become one of the most polluted. A long five hour trip to the fairly high elevated mountain ranges near the border of Guangdong and Hunan Provinces is the perfect getaway from the smog. Home to highest mountain in Guangdong Province, Shikeng peak at about 1,900 meters, the Nanling Forest Recreation Area was one of my highlights during my stay in Guangdong.

From Guangzhou, the South High Speed Railway Station had frequent trains to the town of Shaoguan. However, it's important to book tickets in advance just in case, especially on the weekends. After the two hour ride to Shaoguan, I took a bus to the Shaoguan city long distance bus station, near the train station. Be sure to arrive there before 1pm because the last bus to the Nanling Forest Recreation (the town of Wuzhishan) departs at 3:30pm. You will have to give yourself a whole day to get there from whatever major city you're starting from.

Once I boarded the bus, we were on our way up a steep mountain road. I was excited with anticipation. Suddenly, the bus stopped. Some talkative elderly ladies outside had flagged the bus down and wanted to get on. Because there were no seats, they had to stand in the aisle. Then, the bus stopped again, and more ladies got on. And then, yet again, this continued until there was barely any standing room. After about an hour, I was considering being a gentleman by offering my seat to one of the older ladies. Much to my annoyance, the bus stopped for a fourth and final time. I thought to myself, "We can't fit anyone else on here anymore!" And sure enough, one other person agreed with me. That individual was a stone faced police

officer wearing sunglasses (even though it was late evening), who sternly boarded the bus and beckoned all the standing ladies to disembark and walk. He took a photo of the entire inside of the bus for evidence and I fixed my hair to look handsome. I was lucky that I didn't give up my seat or else I probably would have been one of those stuck in the middle of nowhere. After working out whatever fines the bus driver had to pay with the police officers, which took an extra hour or so, the bus driver got back on the bus. He started the bus engine, drove up the road for about 1km and sure enough, the entire herd of women who were just kicked off the bus. were waiting to get back on. And there we were again in the same situation. We didn't get caught a second time.

Eventually it was nighttime and as I disembarked, I felt the temperature drop... BIG time. My body was shaking like electricity from the chilly air as I opened my backpack to get out my jacket. Fortunately, my hotel, the Orange House, was conveniently located just up the street. Although the Orange House is the best and possibly only hotel in the vicinity (for now), be prepared to use squat toilets because the village of Wuzhishan is quite remote. Nevertheless, after the policeman incident on the bus, my excitement was on the rise again for I would have a whole day to myself to explore the Nanling Forest Recreation Area.

The next morning, I ate breakfast and set off... only to find that the actual trails at the Nanling Forest Recreation Area were about another 8km from the ticket booth. Fortunately, there was a minivan for hire at the front gate and for once, I wasn't cheated. It was 10 yuan for me to be taken to the first of four major trails in the vicinity.

This trail, also known as the Water Valley Trail, was the easiest and a nice little warm up for what lav ahead. I started at the bottom of a small gorge and worked my way up some steps and bridges, following the clear turquoise river up the mountain. There were a number of other tourists on the trail but because of the remoteness of the area, there were thankfully not as many as at Zhaoging, another more popular tourist town in Guangdong Province. I was able to focus my attention on the scenery and the more quiet aspects of the environment. Then, came the first waterfall, a sparkling shower of silvery glitter crashing elegantly into a pool. After witnessing it, I thought, "Well... that was great," And then suddenly, there was another and another and yet another waterfall. One



I was ready to traverse up the second and third trails (which were essentially connected together) so I called up the driver on my cell phone since I considered him to be honest, Boy was I wrong! As soon as he came. I told him where I wanted to go which I believed to be a mere 10 km. Then he wanted 70 yuan. With my eyebrows knitted in consternation, I instead decided to go only most of the way for 50 yuan. Well, it turned out that the total distance of where I originally wanted to go was not 10km but actually about 4km. The mini van taxi driver took me 3km, and dropped me off about 1km away from trails 2 and 3, for 50 yuan. I was definitely cheated this time and a bad mood started to settle within me

Nevertheless, I thought about the original 10 yuan rate I paid earlier, calmed down and meandered over to trail 3. Little Huangshan, which is indeed named after its big daddy, beautiful Huangshan over in Anhuil Province, was a big change of pace from the Water Valley Trail. It's a fairly steep climb, a far cry from the first trail, but still doable in a couple of hours. After passing through some blankets of pine trees, I emerged onto a ledge overlooking the first ridge. A white pagoda stuck straight up from the highest section of the mountain beckoning hilers to complete their journey. So I continued on even though I felt like I was about to die from the climb.

At the top, the stunning views of the rolling mountains made the whole trip worthwhile for my weary legs. And on top of that, the special pine trees that you can see at Anhui Province's Huangshan were also

present here, giving Little Huangshan its proper name. I must have spent about an hour up there absorbing the scenery until I finally started to head back down to trail 2, the Long Waterfalls Trail.

If you haven't had enough waterfalls from the first trail, you will definitely get more than your fair share here. There were at least a dozen, with each one being as picture worthy as the other, all distributed throughout the whole journey.

Upon reaching the bottom, my legs felt rickety and wobbly. I was about 8 km away from the entrance. I got out my phone and considered calling the minivan driver. And then, I decided against it, for I had no desire to use his services again. After about 4km walking back he spotted me on the road and offered a lift, but I still said "no". He drove on and another car stopped at about the 7km mark but I was already almost back to the hotel so I didn't bother.

Despite some inconveniences and the fact that I didn't have time to make it to Shikai Mountain, the fourth trail (which was yet another 15km taxi drive away from the other three trails inside the park), Nanling was like a breath of fresh air from the noise and chaos of China's economic development and furthermore, serves as a reminder that there are still places like these out there.

The Samaranch Memorial

uan Antonio Samaranch is one of the greatest figures in the history of the modern Olympics. He was a reformist who led the Olympic movement into a new golden age and a true believer that sport should transcend all political boundaries. During his twenty-one years at the helm of


the International Olympic Committee, he promoted equal opportunity and fair play for all. His achievements, talents and contributions have earned him worldwide recognition and his influence will not be soon forgotten.

Although Tianjin had little to do with

Samaranch, we are proud to have the Samaranch Memorial in our city. However, according to Mr. Wu Ching-kuo, the Taiwanese president of the International Boxing Association and a good friend of Samaranch, Tianjin has an important place in the development of modern Chinese sport and the successful holding of the Beijing Olympic Games in 2008. He believes that Tianjin's rich cultural and sporting history deserves to be part of the history of the Olympic Games. Now, thanks to Mr Wu, Tianiiners can see many important possessions from Samaranch's life as a dedicated sports enthusiast. Appropriately, this is the city's second memorial to the Olympics, as there is an Olympic Games Memorial in Dagang District, Tianjin, which was also initiated by Mr. Wu.

The new memorial is located in Tuanbo, Jinghai District and has an exhibition area of







3500m2. The main body of the memorial was designed by a team from Archiland International, led by the famous Danish architect Morten Holm. The design of the main building is based on the five Olympic rings and the building is in the shape of two linked rings, which form the figure eight. A beautiful Olympic garden surrounds the memorial, creating a quiet and peaceful environment where one can ponder the achievements of the great man.

All the exhibits came from Samaranch's private collection. Among the 16000 collectibles entrusted to Mr Wu Ching-kuo by Samaranch's daughter, 5000 pieces were selected for display and are presented in a timeline of Samaranch's life. The exhibit includes books and many stamps. There are also souvenirs and paintings that were gifts from leaders of the many countries he visited.



As a sports enthusiast, Samaranch was an avid participant in various sports from his student days and his boxing gloves and hockey stick are also on display.

During his 21 years as the president of IOC, Samaranch successfully resolved several major crises. During the Cold War in the early 1980's, Samaranch dealt with countries in

With his experience and talent in business, he promoted the commercialization of the Olympic Games and saved the IOC from financial crisis. Korean Air acquires stake in Czech Airlines

Korean Air and Czech Airlines formalized Korean Air's acquisition of 44 percent of the Czech airline's shares at a signing ceremony held at the office of the Prime Minister of the Czech Republic in Prague on April 10.

Commemorating the moment were Cho Yang-ho, Chairman and CEO of the Hanjin Group and Korean Air; Chi Chang-hoon, President and COO of Korean Air; Cho Won-tae, Executive Vice President, Corporate Strategy & Planning Division; Prime Minister of the Czech Republic Petr Necas; Miroslav Dvorak, chairman of Czech Aeroholding; and several others.

By acquiring 44 percent of Czech Airline's shares, Korean Air becomes the airline's second-largest shareholder. Chairman Cho expressed his support of the transaction by saying, "We have known Czech Airlines for a number of years, during which we have both been part of the SkyTeam alliance. Our

successful codeshare collaboration only confirms that our decision to become a strategic partner of the Czech national carrier, culminating in our signing of the contract, is the correct decision."

Founded in 1923, Czech Airlines operates 24 aircraft to 44 cities in 24 countries and is a member of the SkyTeam alliance, of which Korean Air is a founding member.

The acquisition of a stake in Czech Airlines will go down in Korean aviation history as it marks the first time that a Korean airline has taken a stake in a foreign airline.

Mai Piao!Mai Piao! Buy Ticket!

y first and foremost reason for traveling around China is to learn, appreciate and diversify my perception of the world. I know that I'm not the smartest guy in the room but I still consider myself to be a curious one. It's what drives me forward in achieving a more heightened perspective of the world. By living and working for an extended period of time in China for the past two and half years, traveling has been one of the best highlights of my time spent here.

Sadly, these opportunities are becoming harder as admission prices continue to rise. I traveled to Huashan two summers ago and the admission price was almost 200 yuan (round trip cable car not included). A sign was put up next to the ticket office proudly proclaiming that Huashan had a tourist satisfaction rate of roughly 95%. More recently, I've heard rumors that admission prices at many major tourist destinations have gone up by at least 30%. I wonder what that satisfaction rate would be now? Come to think of it, I don't recall ever seeing a suggestion box available for any complaints about the price. Oh, well, I guess if I wasn't so tired after the long climb at the end of the day, I would have tried harder to ask for one.

Despite my whining, though, I do believe that we, the visitor, should pay some kind of an admission price. After all, someone has to maintain the site. Otherwise, would it even be there? Furthermore, the issue of historical and environmental preservation is an extremely important issue to consider. I'm happy to contribute to a fee or donation as long as it goes to protecting the site so the rest of the public can enjoy it. But how far is too far?

At the Yungang caves outside of Datong. they have a really spotless VIP Hilton like tourist center. But do most people use it? Well. I didn't. And all the empty chairs I witnessed that day suggested to me that most of the other visitors didn't use it either. The extended shopping street that all the visitors are forced to walk through before exiting with hawkers pressuring us to buy things certainly wouldn't be for everyone. Is this how that extra money is spent? Trying to transform what should be a site of historical interest into some kind of modernized tourist mecca actually takes away from the authenticity of the experience. Why not spend it the profits on more educational interpretive signs outlining some of the history and stories that's depicted from the cave art. They can also hire a foreign English editor to help make the English translation flow a bit better. Yungang certainly wasn't the only place with this problem. The Terra Cotta Warriors and the Huangguoshu Waterfall in Guizhou province are other examples.

门票之殇

我去年夏天去了华山,门票差不多是200元。售票 处旁边的一个牌子上写着这里的游客满意度达到 95%。之前我听说全国主要景点门票都上涨了30%,但 我想知道现在还有多少人对此满意。而且我没看到任 何思见箱,所以就算人们有意见,他们要往哪里投诉 呢?

在云冈石窟,我在买完票以后需要经过一条长长 的购物指才能到法景区。购物苗的小贩们都会缠着游 客招揽生意。这难道就是门票收入的用处吗?为什么 不把这些钱用到增加景点历史背景的宣传或是请一个 外籍专家投好校对一下英文标识呢?

另外一个让人不舒服的地方是,我们明明花高价 买了门票,但还要为一些设必要的服务另外付费。把 售票处设在高入口两三公里以外的地方,然后让你要 公再花30块钱坐摆渡车,要么自己走过去。门票已经 那么高了,车费不应该包含在内吗?

由于门票价格不断在上涨, 我必须省吃俭用才能 完成我环游中国的梦想。我认为, 把门票降下来不但 能让游客满意, 当地的老百姓也会更加真诚地接待这 些游客。

Another problem with admission prices is that you often times have to pay extra money on top of the price for services that you shouldn't particularly need. For example, at Mati Shan in Eastern Gansu province, the ticket office was deliberately built 2-3km from the actual site itself. Therefore, after buying your ticket, you'd have to either spend an extra 30 yuan to take an electric shuttle to the actual site itself or walk. Fortunately, I wasn't 70 years old or I would have complained. If the ticket prices are that high already, shouldn't it be for free? Yesanpo in Hebei Province, the Water curtain cave in Eastern Gansu and the Stone Forest outside of Kunming also do this.

On a final note, I would just like to say that I take great pleasure in helping out the local economies of the places I visit by spending money on accommodation, food, books and a souvenir or two. I often times think about whose hands my money is going to and I love it when it goes to someone who needs it. But now that the admission prices are continuing to rise, I've made more of a concerted effort to save. I have even been in situations where I've only eaten a bowl or two of noodles for the entire day. By lowering admissions prices, not only will it make visitors happy but also the local people who work hard to make our stay comfortable.



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
